Message from the Mayor

In September, the Local Government Association of Queensland released the results of their 2017 Community Satisfaction Tracking Study. This study, which surveys 700 Queenslanders and is released every two years, analyses the depth of community satisfaction with their local government.

What does the study data reveal?

The survey shows that on average, Queensland ratepayers are happy with how their councils are performing. For the first time in the study's history, rural councils have closed the gap with their city counterparts and achieved results that are close to the average of all councils in the state.

The three most important performance measures according to the study are quality of basic services and infrastructure, delivering on promises and minimizing rate increases. Nearly three-quarters of those surveyed considered that rates and charges levied by their local council were excellent, good or fair value for money.

The data continues to show that local communities view the delivery of basic services such as sewerage, waste management, water supply, parking facilities, and road construction and maintenance as important.

Communities believe that financial management and economic development are of high importance in their regions.

When it comes to customer service and communication, communities rated this category as important. Responding to the community received the lowest performance rating in this category. However, rural councils came out on top in this category, receiving the highest rating for customer service and communication. Interestingly, council publications and websites increased as a trusted source of information by over 20% since 2015.

Overall, the community places a high level of importance on the delivery aspects of Council performance, most notably in the provision of basic services, financial management, community safety and communication.

How does the Southern Downs Regional Council respond?

Although responding to the community and consulting with the community scored the lowest on the state-wide survey, rural councils performed the best in this category. Southern Downs Regional Council has made it a priority to increase community consultation. Over the last 18 months Council has consistently asked for feedback on the Budget, the Tourism Strategy, amendments to the Planning Scheme, Invasive Pest Control Scheme, and the design of streetscapes around the region, to name just a few. We're proud of the level of community consultation we have been undertaking, but I'm concerned that only a small number of people participate or respond. While I appreciate that local government issues are not high on most people's priority list, I do encourage everyone to come on board and have your say during the consultation phase rather than find that, once an initiative has commenced, it may be too late.

The survey showed that Council involvement in economic development remains important, and that is a focus for us. A number of new developments will bring investment and jobs into the region. Examples include the \$16 million Bunnings Warehouse, the \$30 million Churches of Christ Care expansion of its retirement facility, the \$40 million Rose City Shoppingworld expansion and the new \$15 million project at John Dee, which together will bring 420 new jobs to the Southern Downs. It's a good time in the region for investment and new jobs.

While rural councils have already scored highly in customer service and communication, at the Southern Downs we continue to strive to be better. We have numerous channels through which you can contact us to find out more. Visit our website, download our app, follow us on social media, and pick up your copy of The Southern Downs Mail. I'd also encourage you to attend any of our scheduled public meetings or a Cuppa with the Councillors session to make your voice heard.

New signage aids safety on Killarney's Condamine River Road

Southern Downs Regional Council has installed two new signs on Killarney's Condamine River Road in a drive to enhance the safety of the travelling public.

Some concerns had been raised with Council about the ability of certain vehicle types and combinations accessing the Condamine River Road in Killarney, which has a number of gravel river crossings.

In a move to address these concerns, and increase safety for road users, Southern Downs Regional Council has installed new signage on Condamine River Road in two locations considered suitable for vehicle turn around. The new signs are located on at the intersection with Brosnan's Road, heading eastbound towards the Gorge and for westbound traffic, at the intersection with Spring Creek Road.

Southern Downs Mayor and Chair of the Local Disaster Management Group, Tracy Dobie welcomed the new signs which she said would create a safer environment for travellers in Killarney.

"The Condamine River Road has several river crossings which are not suitable for access by a range of vehicles including trucks, buses, caravans and trailers.

"This was evident during the Ex-Tropical Cyclone Debbie weather event this year. Access was particularly difficult due to the significant damage caused to the river crossings and locals were concerned about some vehicles attempting to use the road and getting into strife.

"While traffic closures were enforced, with only local residential traffic permitted to access Condamine River Road, the new road signage now makes it abundantly clear that trucks, buses, caravans and trailers cannot access this road. This will also assist Council and local police to better manage road closures and the passage of traffic in this area during extreme weather events in the future.

"Ultimately, the safety of the travelling public and visitors to our region is paramount. We want them to have a safe and enjoyable experience and to leave with fond memories. We don't want them to fall foul of the risks that river crossings can pose to vehicles unsuited to that type of terrain," she said.

Similar signs installed on Spring Creek Road in Killarney have proven successful in discouraging access beyond the signage points and minimising the numbers of vehicles getting into difficulty on the river crossings.

What Does Council Do?

Have you ever wondered what Council actually does? Here's a breakdown of the services Council provides to its residents.

Did you know that Council manages around \$740 million worth of assets?

These assets provide services to the region and include:

- 51 bridges
- 70km of footpaths
- 396km kerb and channel
- 25 bus shelters and 30 bus stops
- 3 dams
- 4 water supply treatment plants

- 343km sewer pipes
- 3 waste management landfills; 15 x manned/unmanned transfer stations
- 612 parks, gardens, camping sites and reserves
- 12 cemeteries
- 1 saleyards; 2 animal pounds
- 2 art galleries
- 3 libraries, 1 mobile library
- 4 swimming pools
- 2 aerodromes

But that's not all! Council provides many other services to the region, which include:

Sport & Rec Forum

Members of sport and recreation groups across the region are invited to Southern Downs Regional Council's second Sport and Recreation Forum on November 16 at the Warwick Town Hall.

The forum will focus on 'Running and Funding your Sport and Recreation Event within the Southern Downs' and aims to encourage sport and recreation groups to work together and collaboratively with Council to achieve a shared vision of Sport and Rec on the Southern Downs.

The forum's key note speaker is Carlee Beattie, an Australian Paralympian, who will share her knowledge and success in the sporting arena.

Carlee grew up in Warwick and has achieved great success both in Australia and overseas.

Carlee Beattie is a star in the long jump pit. Although she was born without a fully formed arm, her long and slender frame meant she was ideal for a career in sport.

Whilst growing up in Warwick, Carlee first found success in hockey and netball, and was named the most valuable player at the 2000 Netball Queensland State Titles. Upon moving to Brisbane to attend University, Carlee was approached by an athletics coach in a shopping centre car park, after which she turned her attention towards Para-athletics. She was inspired by the opportunities now available to athletes with a disability and quickly set about reaching the highest level of Paralympic sport.

While most athletes make their international debut at tournaments and competitions outside of a Paralympic Games, Carlee kicked off her international career in Beijing. Although she didn't medal, the 2008 Paralympic Games were a learning curve for Carlee, and it wasn't long before she stood among the world's best.

In the lead-up to the 2012 Paralympic Games, Carlee trained using a prosthetic arm to assist strength and conditioning. At the 2011 IPC Athletics World Championships in Christchurch, her next major international meet after Beijing, she claimed Silver in long jump and Bronze in the 100m sprint. That same year she broke her own World Record at the Sydney Track Classic, jumping 6.01m – 8cm on her previous record. Later that same year she won Silver at the IPC World Championships in Lyon, France.

Carlee bagged silver in London with a jump of 5.57m. She matched this performance at the 2016 Games in Rio, where she won bronze. But her proudest moment on the Track was winning a Gold Medal at the 2015 IPC World Championships in Doha, Qatar.

An Update on Major Projects & Roadworks in Your Area

The Council's priorities for gravel re-sheeting are based on the following;

Mr Jubb Visits Council to Talk Pests

In September, Council welcomed Mr Robert Jubb to their Briefing Session to speak to Council and Local Laws Officers who have been involved in conducting the Invasive Pest Control Scheme.

Mr Jubb has led an inspirational life. An escapee during WW2 when his airplane crashed landed in France, he was the only survivor of the crash. He spent many weeks on the run from the German Army until he was rescued by the French Resistance and evacuated to England. He brings with him an extraordinary legacy of bravery and service to his country.

His family owns Rocklands, a property in Palgrave.

He has single-handedly tackled the invasive pests on his land – boxthorn, lantana, velvety tree pear, and blackberry; and even now in his 90s he still spends three days each week spraying weeds. He has become aware of the Invasive Pest Management Control Scheme and gave Council and officers a short presentation on his experiences.

Mr Jubb congratulated the Council officers for their work in implementing the Invasive Pest Control Scheme, likening their frontline role to that of 'soldiers'.

Thank you, Mr Jubb, for your time and offering your expertise in pest management.
